Priest: Listen to the words of the prophet Hosea:

The trader calls out to the Lord his God, but in his hands are dishonest scales, and in all he does he loves to oppress.

He calls out, "Aha! I have become very rich and no one can prove that I gained it by sin."

Return to me, the Lord your God,

Intercessions

The leader takes a handful of sand and runs it through his or her fingers saying:

As numberless as the grains of sand in a desert, so are those who, through countless years have fallen victim to war and violence. This day we pray that the names of the hurt may be spoken gently and with compassion; the names of the dead remembered in the minds of those who loved them; the names of the bereaved whispered with a tender embrace.

All: May the angels of heaven repeat the names of all those who suffer in the heavenly assembly and may God treasure them in his heart.

People are invited to name out loud or in silence any person or group or place involved in war.....

God our Father to whom we bow in worship, and from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name, we confess to you the fractures of mistrust, fear, and the wielding of force which sets family against family, nation against nation. In the tension of our present days, strengthen those who would strive after justice and peace through word and example, and grant your wisdom and guidance to those who bear the power and responsibility for war.

We pray

- for the soldier in whatever uniform, for their anxious families overwhelmed by foreboding;

silence

- for the civilian, threatened by act of terror, fall of bomb, flight of bullet;

silence

- for the health services, that they may be ready to heal, silence
- and for those who will hold the hand of the dying, and speak gentle words of comfort to the grieving.

Our Father, throughout the world, confirm where we do your will; confound all evil in which we play a part; and set us free to live all our lives in abundant wholeness. So we pray in Jesus name.

All: Amen

Invitation

Priest: This is the table,

not of the Church, but of the Lord. It is to be made ready for those who love him and who want to love him more.

So, come, you who have much faith and you who have a little, you who have been here often and you who have not been for a long time, you who have tried to follow and you who have failed.

Come, not because it is I who invite you: it is our Lord. It is his will that those who want him should meet him here.

Offertory hymn

Procession of the bread and wine

Priest: We bring this gift of bread to the table of Christ.

All: Bread, Christ's body, broken for our brokenness.

As we share in one bread we draw closer to Christ

and to each other.

Priest: We bring this gift of wine to the table of Christ.

All: Wine, Christ's blood, poured out

for the healing of the nations. As we share in Christ's death

we are reminded of who we are...

One in Him, bringing hope to the poor,

and justice to the oppressed.

No more stolen bread! No more spilt blood!

The story

Priest: Now let us hear the story

Of how this sacrament began.

On the night on which Jesus was betrayed,

he sat at supper with his disciples.

While they were eating, he took a piece of bread,

said a blessing,

broke it and gave it to them with the words,

"This is my body. It is broken for you.

Do this to remember me."

Later, he took a cup of wine, saying, "This cup is God's new covenant,

sealed with my blood.

drink from it, all of you, to remember me."

So now, following Jesus' example and command,

we take this bread and this wine, the ordinary things of the world

which Christ will make special.

And as he said a prayer before sharing,

let us do so too.

Eucharistic prayer

Priest: Gratitude, praise, hearts lifted high,

voices full and joyful... these you deserve.

For when we were nothing, you made us something.
When we had no name and no faith and no future you called us your children.
When we lost our way or turned away, you did not abandon us.
When we came back to you, your arms opened wide in welcome.

And look, you prepare a table for us offering not just bread, not just wine, but your very self so that we may be filled, forgiven, and healed, blessed and made new again. You are worth all our pain and all our praise.

So now, in gratitude, we join our voices to those of the Church on earth and in heaven;

Sanctus

All: Holy, holy, holy Lord,

God of power and might.

Heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Priest: Lord God,

as we come to share the richness of your table,

we cannot forget the rawness of the earth.

We cannot take bread

and forget those who are hungry.

Your world is one world

and we are stewards of its nourishment.

All: Lord, put our prosperity

at the service of the poor.

Priest: We cannot take wine

and forget those who are thirsty. The ground and the rootless,

the earth and its weary people cry out for justice.

All: Lord, put our fullness

at the service of the empty.

Priest: We cannot hear your words of peace

and forget the world at war

or, if not at war, then preparing for it.

All: Show us quickly, Lord,

how to turn weapons into welcome signs and the lust for power into a desire for peace.

Priest: We cannot celebrate the feast of your family

and forget our divisions.

We are one in spirit, but not in fact. History and hurt still dismember us.

All: Lord, heal your church

in every brokenness.

Prayer of consecration

Priest: For us you were born,

for us you healed, preached, taught and showed the way to heaven;

for us you were crucified,

and for us, after death, you rose again.

Lord Jesus Christ, present with us now,

for all that you have done

and all that you have promised,

what have we to offer?

Our hands are empty,

our hearts are sometimes full of wrong things.

We are not fit to gather up the crumbs

from under your table.

But with you is mercy

and the power to change us.

So as we do in this place what you did in an upstairs room, send down your Holy Spirit on us and on these gifts of bread and wine that they may become for us your body, healing, forgiving and making us whole; and that we may become, for you, your body, loving and caring in the world until your kingdom comes.

All: Amen

Taking and breaking the bread

Among friends, gathered round a table, Jesus took bread, broke it and said, "This is my body, it is broken for you."

Take this – all of you – to remember me."

Priest: Look, here is your Lord coming to you
